(a) Critically comment on Milton's blending of tradition and originality in Invocation of Paradise Lost, Book I.

- (b) William Blake claims that Milton, in his epic poem Paradise Lost, was "of the Devil's party without knowing it." Discuss Milton's portrayal of Satan in Paradise Lost, Book I, in the light of the above observation.
- (c) Would you consider Ben Jonson's The Alchemist as a social satire? Substantiate your answer with references to the text.

- (d) Critically comment on the portrayal of Sir Epicure Mammon in The Alchemist.
- (e) Critically comment on Aphra Behn's representation of women characters in The Rover.

(f) Analyse the significance of the Carnival scenes in Aphra Behn's The Rover.

(g) Is it justified to argue that Pope's use of the 'Machinery' in The Rape of the Lock heightens both the satire and the poetry? Substantiate your response with suitable textual illustrations.

- (h) Would you subscribe to the view that Pope shares a love-hate relationship with Belinda in The Rape of the Lock? Validate your response with reference to the text.
- Answer any four of the following questions in about 60 words each: 2×4=8
 - (a) 'Fall'n Cherub, to be weak is miserable

- (b) Briefly comment on the significance of Pandemonium.
- (c) Comment on the significance of Prologue in Ben Jonson's The Alchemist.

Or:

- (e) "Vincentio may perhaps increase her bags, but not her family." Locate and explain.

Or,

- (f) Comment on the significance of the Blunt-Lucetta episode in Act III of The Rover.
- (g) "Ev'n then, before the fatal engine clos'd, A wretched Sylph too fondly interpos'd;" — What is being referred to as the "fatal engine"? What happened to the "wretched sylph"?

Or

(h) Who wins the Game of Ombre? What is the significance of this victory?
