Mapping Minor Intellectual Traditions: Thoughts from Bengal

The seminar series proposes to map the minor intellectual traditions from Bengal. The prevalent image/ idea of Bengal associated with literature, culture and intellectual pursuits predictably celebrates the cultural and discursive milieu surrounding Kolkata and the thought practices of the *bhadralok* classes and castes while ignoring the thought geographies and epistemes outside the normative and elite academic zones and spheres of influence. The seminar series seeks to address the ideas coming from the margins - understood in terms of region, influence, resources, social groups, ideas etc. The lost/ buried/ marginalised thought traditions and cultural practices would be discussed and engaged with to provincialise metro- centric and normative discourses of Bengal.
