# **Concept Note**

Whither Bengal politics? Is the much-vaunted secular and progressive political lexicon in Bengal set for an identity based or right-wing take over? Is there any possibility of a progressive political resurgence in Bengal? Does the incremental 'rise' of OBCs and Dalits in Bengal destabilize the entrenched upper caste/ Bhadralok hegemony? How can the Bengali Muslims reclaim their political agency? How to address the growingly saffronized North Bengal Question? How can CAA and anti- CAA Movement impact Bengal politics? What role can COVID 19 play in Bengal Politics in the days to come? This Panel Discussion seeks to find answers to these questions. It proposes to understand the contested terrain of Bengal politics through the dialectic of the local and the national, the secular and the religious, the centre and the periphery, the normative and the irruptive. Speakers will visit the past to understand the current socio-political transformations and will try to invoke the future through their analysis.
