Course Outcomes

SEMESTER-I

CC -I: History of India From Earliest Times to 300BCE

Students will acquire knowledge regarding the primitive life and socio- cultural status of the people of ancient India. They can gather knowledge about the society, culture, religion and political history of ancient India. They will learn about trade and urbanization of ancient civilization, like Harappan civilization, Vedic civilizations etc.

CC -II: Social Formations & the Cultural Pattern of the Ancient World other than India.

Students of can understand about the evolution of human Society & how the society of agricultural and animal husbandry had begun in Ancient Times. They also learn how the human society had Transformed from Nomadic to civilized society in ancient history of the World. They can acquire knowledge about the ancient Greek and Roman society. They can compare to each and other.

SEMESTER-II

CC -III : History of India II (C 300BCE - 750 AD)

They can learn about the economic transformation of India during this period. They can understand the rise of Indian feudalism and evolution of the political structures of early-medieval north and south India. They can get a thorough idea of rise of ancient Indian empire. They can learn how the early Indian society, culture, religion and agrarian structures was transformed at the advent of the Islam. power of

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SEMESTER-IV CC -VIII: Rise of Modern West – II History students will learn about the European crisis of economic, social and political dimensions as well as the English Revolution, major issues like political and intellectual currents in 17th century. They will learn about the rise of modern science in relation to European society by the Renaissance and the European politics in the 18th century like parliamentary monarchy, patterns of Absolutism in Europe and prelude to the Industrial Revolution in England and other European countries. CC -IX: History of India (1526-1605) They acquire knowledge towards the Turkey's invasion & Struggle for Empire in North-Western India and foundation of the Mughal Rule in India. Students will learn about the Mughal Indian society, economy and culture after consolidation of the Mughal rule India. CC -X: History of India III (1605-1750) They will learn from this course about the consolidation and expansion of the Mughal empire and how far it has changed its character during the reign of Aurangzeb. They can understand the roots of the fall of Mughal empire as well. They will square knowledge on visual culture of this times. At the end of this course they will understand the features of 18th century India. SEMESTER-V CC Paper-XI History of Modern Europe I (1789 - 1939) They will learn about the French Revolution and its impact of European countries. Unity and power makes people to strength which has showed in the French revolution in 1789. How the Industrialization had occurred and it's affected on socio economic transformation of Europe. They will know about the politics of super power among the European countries. How the sense regarding the nationalism and unification had developed among the European countries on eve of the 2ndworldwar. Students can understand about the rise of imperialism and how far German imperialism was responsible for the first and second world war. They will know about the Bolshevik revolution and the politics between two world war. CC - XII: History of India (1750-1857) Students of history will learn how to raise regional powers in India after the downfall of the Mughal Empire and in the course of time how to rise of the Company's absolute power in India. They can understand about the colonial nature of state during 200 years rule of the British power in this land. Hey can gather knowledge about how the Indian society, politics, religion and economy had changed during the Company's rule in

India. They will understand how the company's economic exploitation made Indian revolutionary against the British rule. That ultimately paved the background of the Great Revolt of 1857. SEMESTER-VI CC r- XIII: History of India (1857-1964) Students can acquire vast knowledge on local rebellion and movements like the Indigo rebellion, the Deccan Riots, the growth of the new middle class; the age of associations, the Aligarh movement, the Arya and the Prarthana Samaj aftermath of 1857. They will learn the real historiography of Indian Nationalism; Birth of Indian National Congress, The Moderates and the Extremists, Partition of Bengal, the Swadeshi movement in Bengal in 1905. They can acquire knowledge how to rise of Gandhis power in Indian politics and his activities towards the freedom like, Rowlatt Satyagraha, Khilafat and Non-cooperation movement, The Swarajya party, Poona Pact, Civil Disobedience Movement, Quit India Movement. They also learn how to raise communal politics and opposition politics on the eve of the freedom movement in India and aftermath of partition in India. CC -XIV: History of World Politics (1945 – 1994) Students will learn about the post-war developments of Social, Political and Economic scenarios of the World and decolonization and the emergence of the Third world. As well as they will learn origin of the Cold War and Changing World political Scenarios and emerging trends in culture, Media and Revolution among European countries. Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) DSE -A-1: /SEM-5: History of Bengal: 1757-1906 Student can know about the rise and decline of the Bengal under the Nawab. They can understand the process of the rise and growth of British empire in Bengal after the Battle of Plassey. They can understand the transformation of Bengali society in 19th century; especially about the social and religious reformation during the said time. At the same time, they can gain the knowledge about the exploitative character of British govt that gave birth so called Bengali nationalism, DSE - A-3:/ SEM-6: History of I Bengal (1905-1947) This course will help the students to know about the origins and impact of swadeshi movement, emergence of communal politics in Bengal, rise of militant nationalism, role of Bengal; Subhash Chandra Bose in Indian national movement. They can draw a vivid picture of political scenario of Bengal on the eve of partition. DSE-B-2/ SEM-5: History of South East Asia: 19th Century This course will help the students understanding the nature of pre-colonial society, and folk culture of south east Asia. They can learn about the emergence of colonial rule and transformation of Thai state under foreign rule. Beside of that they can understand about the contradiction of native and colonial culture as well. DSE-B-4:/SEM-6: History of South East Asia: 20th Century Students will know about the modernization of south east Asia. It will help the students understanding radical movement of Vietnam and Indonesia. They will know the role of south east Asian states in international politics. DSE - B-1/SEM-5: History of Modern East Asia (1840-1949): China Students will learn about the nature and structure of the traditional Chinese society and how to transform the Chinese society from traditional to modern cultures. They can also learn about how the strong countries of the World were captured the Chinese society, culture and economy during the nineteenth century. They will be aware how the Chinese were united towards the foreign colonial powers and defeated them and ultimately gain to freedom. DSE-B-3:/SEM-6: History of Modern East Asia (1868-1945): Japan This course will make the student of history aware about the transformation of feudal society and rise of capitalism in Japan. They will know the process through which Japan emerged as a Fascist power. DSE-A-2:/SEM-5: History of United State of America-I (1776-1945) They will learn about the socio-political and economical status of USA after consolidation of colonial power. Students will know how the discrimination between north and south America caused civil war. They acquire knowledge how to growth capitalism in USA and becomes a World power. They will gather knowledge how the USA introduced New Deal and remained abandoned from all warfare activities of the World and ultimately turned as controller country of World politics. DSE -A-4: /SEM-6: History of United State of America-II (1776-1945) Students can understand the emergence of USA as a liberated nation, its reform movement, imperial activities, relation with African states, women emancipation movement etc. As well as they will aware towards several treaty, alliance and conferences during the prior of World-war-II. Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) SEC -A-I: / Archives & Museums in India Students will learn how to maintain documentary, visual and material remains of the past either in house or Institutions. Students will be encouraged to undertake collection, documentation and exhibition of such materials in their localities and colleges. They can understand towards the important and significance of the Museum and Archives

to build the history of India. Thus education tour to the National Archives and National Museum is an integral part of the history students. SEC-A-2: OR Understanding Heritage Students to understand the different facets of heritage and their significance. They also understand about the legal and institutional frameworks for heritage protection in India as the challenges facing it. They can examine towards the implications of the rapidly changing interface between heritage and history. They will gather knowledge about the heritage through project and visit to Museum and Archives. SEC-B-1: -Understanding Popular Culture They will gather knowledge towards the popular culture through audio-visual expressions like, Folk Art, Calendar Art and Photography. They will acquire knowledge about the Theatre, Music, folk songs and Jatras by performance and Participation in real life. They can realized about the impact of the internet and audio-visual media on popular culture of the World. SEC-B-2: Art Appreciation: An introduction to Indian Art Students will learn about the Indian art, from ancient to contemporary times, in order to understand and appreciate its diversity and its aesthetic richness. As well as student will equip with the abilities to understand art as a medium of cultural expression. It will give students direct exposure to Indian art through visuals, and visits to sites and museums. Analyze major constitutional changes and political developments, such as the Government of India Acts, the role of regional parties, and pivotal events leading to the transfer of power. iv. Explore the dynamics of communal politics and the partition of India, studying the demand for Pakistan, regional and national responses, and British policies leading to India's division.

Objectives of the Course: i This course examines India's development as a modern nationstate following independence. ii It is focusing on major political, social, and economic shifts from the drafting of the Constitution to the establishment of parliamentary democracy, economic planning, and responses to regionalism and social justice issues. iii Each module investigates significant milestones and policies that influenced India's path as a newly independent country. iv It is addressing the challenges of integration, nation-building, and socio-economic reforms.

Learning Outcomes of the Course: By the end of this course, students will be able to: i) Examine the formation and significance of India's Constitution ii) Analyze the integration of princely states iii) Discuss early economic reforms in land policy and the beginnings of centralized planning, iv) Evaluate the influence of Jawaharlal Nehru's policies during his tenure as Prime Minister, focusing on his approach to nation-building and socio-economic development. v) Understand the establishment and functioning of parliamentary democracy vi) Explore the challenges of sub-nationalism and identity politics within India, vii) Assess the impact of economic decolonization viii) Investigate regionalism and the assertion of backward classes(e.g., Dalits and Adivasis) in

shaping political dynamics and policies toward social inclusion. ix) Trace the rise of new political parties and assess how their emergence transformed Indian politics and the structure of the Congress party.

SEMESTER-VI Title of The Course: Rise of the Modern West: Mid-15th- 17th Century DC Major Paper Code: HIS-DC-MJ-601 Semester = VI Credit = 4.

Objectives of the Course: This course explores the transformative period in European history from the Renaissance through the early stages of European state formation, ii It is focusing on the socio-political, economic, and cultural shifts that defined early modern Europe. iii The course examines key developments such as the Renaissance and its influence on humanism and art, the religious upheaval of the Reformation, the establishment of early modern states, and the dawn of colonial expansion and economic change.

Learning Outcomes of the Course: By the end of this course, students will be able to: i. Understand the social roots of the Renaissance and explain how humanism shaped European intellectual and artistic life, cultural impact. ii. Analyze the causes and effects of the Reformation and CounterReformation, iii. Evaluate the significance of the Thirty Years' War across Europe, including its impact on emerging state systems. iv. Examine the development of key European states (Spain, France, England, and Russia), identifying the political and cultural factors that influenced the establishment and evolution of their governance structures. v. Explore the motives and outcomes of early European colonial expansion, particularly focusing on the explorations of Portugal and Spain, and understand how these voyages reshaped global trade networks and shifted economic power from the Mediterranean to the Atlantic. vi. Assess the commercial and price revolutions that arose from the shift in trade routes, understanding the economic transformations that led to the rise of capitalism and altered European economies.

Title of The Course: Rise of the Modern West: 17th –Mid 18th Century DC Major Paper Code: HIS-DC-MJ-602 Semester = VI Credit = 4.

Objectives of the Course: This course examines the critical transformations in Europe from the 17th to the 18th century, a period marked by revolutionary ideas, political restructuring, scientific advances, and economic shifts. ii It is covering events from the crises that shaped early modern Europe to the Industrial Revolution. iii This course offers insights into the development of European political systems, and economic theories.

Learning Outcomes of the Course: By the end of this course, students will be able to: i. Analyze the crises in 17th-century Europe, understanding the economic, social, and political forces that reshaped European societies and contributed to transformative conflicts. ii. Evaluate the causes, key issues, and intellectual currents of the English Revolution,. iii. Understand the Scientific Revolution up to the 18th century, iv. Examine the role of mercantilism in shaping the European economy in the 17th and 18th centuries, and discuss its impact on colonial expansion, trade, and the emergence of early capitalist practices. v. Discuss the political and economic factors leading to the American War of Independence and assess its global significance as well as its influence on European political ideas. vi. Identify and compare European political patterns in the 18th century, particularly the establishment of parliamentary monarchies and variations of absolutism, understanding how these systems influenced governance and societal organization. vii. Explore the causes and implications of the Industrial Revolution, engaging with debates on the transition from feudalism to capitalism and understanding its transformation.


